What Matters Most for Locunity

The top opportunity, top risk, and top watch for Locunity's agenda this week.

Opportunity

Top opportunity: **SB 707 compliance wave is accelerating** — San Ramon's 4-0 vote and San Mateo County's parallel resolution create immediate outreach windows for Locunity's transcription and archival products before the July 1 deadline.

Risk

Top risk: OUSD's **formal Brown Act violation acknowledgment** highlights enforcement exposure for bodies that lack compliant meeting infrastructure — but could also prompt jurisdictions to restrict recording or comment processes in ways that limit data access.

Watch

Top watch: Contra Costa County's **AI-powered elder scam data** (8,100 APS reports, 25% financial fraud) signals growing local government attention to AI harms — a narrative that could shape AI procurement sentiment in a core Locunity market.



Emerging Trends

Patterns gaining momentum across jurisdictions and public bodies.

- **SB 707 compliance adoption is accelerating** across Bay Area cities: San Ramon voted to adopt its disruption policy this week while San Mateo County's Board of Supervisors agendized a parallel Brown Act remote-access resolution, creating a widening market for compliance-ready meeting platforms.
- Brown Act enforcement is surfacing as a **recurring pressure point** for school boards and councils — OUSD's formal violation acknowledgment follows a pattern of public-comment disputes that elevate demand for compliant meeting infrastructure.
- Bay Area counties are **racing to lock in federal clean-energy credits** before potential policy changes, with Contra Costa's \$11M OPTERRA contract structured explicitly to capture expiring incentives — a pattern likely to repeat in other jurisdictions.



What Stood Out

Unexpected moves, outlier decisions, or coalition shifts worth noticing.

- OUSD's Board took the unusual step of **formally admitting a Brown Act violation on the record** and issuing a cease-and-desist commitment — a rare public concession that could embolden future enforcement actions against other bodies.
- El Cerrito faces a **90-day lawsuit deadline** to finalize district election maps, with three draft maps now public and renter-representation along the San Pablo Corridor emerging as the central tension — an unusually compressed timeline for a redistricting process.



What to Act On

Items that appear ready to move, plus the ones worth keeping on your radar.

Act now

Items we caught that have a live decision point, hearing, vote, or outreach window.

- San Mateo County Board of Supervisors is set to **adopt a Brown Act remote-access disruption policy** — a direct SB 707 compliance action worth monitoring for outreach timing.
- El Cerrito must **finalize its district map within 90 days** or face lawsuit liability; public input hearings are active now.

Expected next

Items likely to move next based on the meeting record and stated next steps.

- San Mateo County supervisors are expected to **vote on the Brown Act remote-access disruption resolution** agendized for June 9.

- OUSD Board will consider the **Brown Act violation acknowledgment** and a 56-item consent report including a \$306K general counsel contract at its June 10 meeting.
- SF Board of Supervisors will take up **building permit fee adjustments** that could shift development cost structures citywide.

Worth monitoring

Items worth keeping on your radar as the next step takes shape.

- Monitor whether additional Bay Area jurisdictions **adopt SB 707 disruption policies** before the July 1 compliance deadline — each adoption is a potential sales signal.
- Watch for SF Board of Supervisors action on the mayor's pledge to **backfill federal HIV/AIDS funding cuts**, which requires budget finalization this month.
- El Cerrito's **district map finalization** will proceed through additional public hearings; the 90-day clock creates urgency for a decision before late summer.
- Track BART board follow-up on **Clipper2 glitches and service-expansion demands** as the district navigates a ballot-measure year.

Where We Saw Movement

Government Operations

115 items

- BART Board approved MTC financial efficiency review strategies 9-0; implementation steps next.
- OUSD Board agendized formal Brown Act violation acknowledgment for cutting off public comment — direct open-meetings enforcement case in a P0 jurisdiction.
- San Mateo County Board to adopt Brown Act remote-access disruption policy, paralleling SB 707 compliance actions elsewhere.
- El Cerrito faces 90-day lawsuit deadline to finalize district election maps; three draft maps now public.

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Technology & Innovation

12 items

- San Ramon voted 4-0 to adopt SB 707 technology-disruption policy ahead of July 1 deadline — direct compliance-market signal.
- Contra Costa flagged AI-powered financial scams driving 25% of 8,100 APS reports; shapes local AI-harm narrative.
- BART directors raised persistent Clipper2 glitches and service-expansion pressure heading into ballot-measure year.
- SF mayor announced Chinatown Wi-Fi and public safety tech investments alongside park renovation.

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Health & Human Services

14 items

- SF mayor pledged to backfill federal HIV/AIDS funding cuts; Board of Supervisors must finalize budget commitment this month.
- Contra Costa authorized RFQ for Federal D. Glover Community Wellness Network lead entity on consent.
- Solano County approved \$526,668 state agreement for two-year childhood lead poisoning prevention program.
- Alameda County DCFS presented status update on State Auditor's child welfare findings.

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Transportation

5 items

- Contra Costa approved \$11M OPTERRA solar/EV contract structured to capture up to \$20M in federal tax credits before potential elimination.
- Oakland committee considered extending Lyft bike share franchise through 2032 with new equipment advertising authority.
- SF Land Use and Transportation Committee took up proposed ban on uncertified lithium-ion batteries under the Fire Code.

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Education

5 items

- OUSD Board to approve 3-year, \$306K base-salary general counsel contract with total first-year compensation exceeding \$440K.
- 56-item general consent report covers facilities, transportation, translation services, and grants — bulk approval unless items pulled.
- Pupil discipline consent report includes three expulsions, one readmission, and one admission.

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Housing

1 item

- SF Board of Supervisors agendized building permit fee adjustments that would alter development costs and city revenue.
- Watch for full-body vote and any developer or advocacy group testimony on fee impact.

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Economic Development

1 item

- SF Port Commission received informational presentation on Blue Economy Initiative focused on maritime and ocean-based economic development.

- Watch for formal policy proposals or RFPs emerging from the initiative — potential Phillips 66 or port-adjacent customer relevance.

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Social Issues

2 items

- San Mateo County and Alameda County both recognized Jewish American Heritage Month with JCRC proclamations.
- Ceremonial items; no policy action required.

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
